

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CATHOLIC IDENTITY

The Catholic Identity of our School has its foundations in three saints. St Martin, St Dominic and St Mary MacKillop. During 2020, the focus, through the leadership and planning with Mr Ben Ryan, was on what our school's saints bring to our lives today.

Their lives bring us traditions which we have as foundations stones for how our community can develop. A community that flourishes and develops good citizenship for both the children and families. St Mary MacKillop's Charism is - In Omnibus Caritas - In All Things Love. St Martin and St Dominic charism is – Veritas - Truth.

This year we all had the opportunity to live out these charisms through our practice and experiences. To lead this Mr Ben Ryan began his tenure as Assistant Principal Religious Identity and Mission (APRIM). His work enabled planning and support for all of the following experiences:

Liturgy and Prayer

Although there were many disruptions this year the children at Saint Martin's have regularly been involved in Community prayer, Youth Ministry and Eucharistic celebrations. Each class presented a community prayer and to make sure no one missed the experience we were able to film them and send home to families.

Community Prayer

Community Prayer is a small gathering where the larger community come together in prayer. Community prayer has focused on the following themes:

Staff Faith Formation

Ben Ryan lead staff faith formation throughout the year. This covered:

- Weekly Staff Prayer
- Staff meetings prayer.
- Crossways Curriculum development.
- Support for Teacher accreditation.
- A six-week program called "The Chosen".

Holy Week

Due to COVID-19 disruptions - the children participated in creating Holy Week movies where students re-enacted the key moments in the final days of Jesus' earthly life. These were then uploaded to the Seesaw app for families to share together.

Youth Ministry

VERITAS Youth Group

The weekly Veritas Youth group has been very popular this year and uses the motto of Fun, Faith and Friends. Veritas is held each Wednesday night for year 4 to year 6 students, and in 2020 has seen an increase in student attendance, with an average of 35 students participating. Some of the Veritas themes have been:

Leadership, Teamwork, Self-Care, Different ways of experiencing prayer (student lead, youth minister lead, shared prayer, songs, creative activities).

Veritas also held Smash Nights once a term which are bigger nights where we do something a little different as a group e.g. water fight, movie night, quiz night

Journey to Emmaus

The 2020 Journey to Emmaus program invited year 6 students from South West Region schools to come together to meet, build friendships and share together. The days were run by our regional Youth Ministers Sara and Ben.

The J2E program is normally spread over 3 separate days, however due to restrictions day 1 was held at individual schools on August 19, with Days 2 and 3 were combined into a final day, with 90 students from SMDPS, CTK and ST Bernadette's coming together on 29 October. The themes of Journey to Emmaus were 'Walking with Jesus' and 'Being the face of Jesus'.

Compassion in Action

The school Social Justice group, CIA (Compassion in Action) – is a 'faith in action' group for years 5 and 6 where students reflect on what we can learn from how Jesus treated others. - Each meeting starts with student led prayer, using a prayer from the 'Prayer Jar' created by the CIA group. CIA meets weekly and has worked on the following:

- a 'Guess the number of lollies in the jar' competition to raise money for Caritas;
- Vinnies Winter Appeal creating posters to raise awareness and helping to create a promotional video;
- Hutt Street Centre, Walk a Mile;
- kindness rocks painted and left around the school (and local community) to bring joy in uncertain times;
- learning about homelessness; and
- Vinnies Christmas Appeal: speaking to classes and creating Christmas decorations to help promote the collection.

Sacramental Preparation

A beautiful celebration of Reconciliation was held after 4 weeks of family group meetings. Eighteen students received this sacrament.

Parish Partnership

- A strong partnership continued between the school and the Parish.
- Craig Fosdike attended the Parish council meeting each month.
- Ben Ryan worked with the sacramental Program.
- We accommodated Funeral parking when requested.
- The parish sold to the school a portion of land so the school could build classrooms and support was given by the assistant priest to allow the building process to proceed.

Principal Tours and Enrolment Meetings

When meeting families for the first time I talk about the fact that we aspire through our actions and what we teach the children, that we are truthful people, that it is expected that all our students tell the truth, that they play by the rules, respect the adults in our world, respect each other. We tell them that this is what a good citizen does. In all things love we encourage them to embrace life with energy and enthusiasm, to flourish and to help our school flourish. The children can expect that the teachers will travel with them daily, in the quest for learning. Understanding that life has struggles, that you get better by practice and more practice and that you have an obligation to make this world a better place.

IMPROVING STUDENT LEARNING AND WELLBEING

The biggest challenge we faced with the COVID-19 pandemic was maintaining for our students their opportunities for continual growth in their learning. The 3-step plan we implemented at the end of Term 1 and for the start of Term 2 allowed our teaching staff time to plan for online teaching and learning. Fortunately, this was minimised by the success of controlling the virus in SA. The teachers are to be commended for their outstanding flexibility and commitment to ensure that no child was disadvantaged whether at school or home.

We have still completed an incredible year of professional learning. This has been supported by a strategic plan to add significant investment for 2020 to the teaching and Learning Programs.

Visible Learning

- All Teachers completed the following units of work:
- Research behind how students learn.
- Understanding and designing surface learning.
- Understanding and designing deep learning.
- Understanding and designing transfer learning.
- The importance of Feedback to student's learning.
- Creating Effective Assessment for teaching and learning using SOLO Taxonomy.

In January 2021 this three-year project will finish and we will develop a Teacher Effectiveness Framework so that there is from R-6, a consistency in the teaching programs and in assessment.

A review was conducted by Mrs Jess Ainslie and a report tabled on the effectiveness of Visible Learning in classrooms. This has become the Visible Learning Plan 2020 – 2022.

Literacy Program and Review

Ben Catalano and the Literacy Review Team (consisting of Ingrid Garton [Literacy Intervention], Amanda Murray, Deanna Smith, Erin Coppins and Rosetta Hamood) led an Early Years literacy review focusing on the areas of spelling; writing; reading and phonological awareness

The review team undertook significant professional learning in:

- brain science of reading;
- understanding dyslexia; and
- engaging an educational consultant from Fullarton House.

The review has led to the following changes in literacy practices:

- Phonological practices.
- Screening and assessment.
- Introduction of the Heggerty Phonological and Phonemic Awareness program (Reception to Year 2).
- Targeted intervention for identified students.
- Significant resourcing of decodable books in Reception to Year 2.
- Utilising decodable readers before PM readers.

Aligning current scope and sequence across all areas of literacy in line with the new approach Commitment to:

- Soundwaves
- 7 Steps to Writing
- Phonological and Phonemic Awareness
- Classroom practices for Dyslexic children

Numeracy

Mathematics received a strong focus this year. Mrs Mackereth worked as a coach to teachers and students across all year levels. There has been good growth in the learning across all year levels and Judy has provided significant support for those learners who find maths hard and easy. This school program will be strengthened next year with Mrs Mackereth working 3 days. The school has also invested in the highly recommended online program called Think Mentals.

Some of the work achieved by Mrs Judy Mackereth in 2020 was:

- Designed an overview of maths learning currently in our classes.
- Worked in Year 3 and 5 classes with small groups of children.
- Observed and coached teachers in their teaching of number.
- Developed and worked with advanced maths groups for Year 5 and 6 students.
- Attended Professional development (PD) at the Primary Maths Association.
- Ran PD for staff on maths literacy.
- Introduced Think Mentals an online number program.
- Designed an intervention program for year 2 students in maths literacy.

Positive Education

- Positive Education continues to be a valued program within our community
- Pos Ed Days each term focusing on Character Strengths, Relationships, Growth Mindset and Gratitude
- · We were able to complete the Walk a Mile in my Boots campaign
- An explicitly taught curriculum was used from Schoolies to Year 6.
- Staff were provided with a new curriculum resource Positive Education Enhanced Curriculum through the Institute of Positive Education.
- Parent education continued through regular articles on the School's website.
- Ben Catalano was chosen as a presenter at the Positive Education Schools Australia National Conference
- A new Wellbeing survey was developed by CESA The Pulse Survey was completed by all students in Terms 3 and 4. This data
 was then used by teachers and leadership to support the wellbeing for all children

Digital Literacy

Miss Christine Houareau was appointed as Digital Literacy Coordinator for 0.4. Her role included:

- Teaching digital literacy to year 3 6 classes.
- Teaching coding skills to Year 3-6 classes.
- Developing a 3D printing program including the purchase of two 3D Printers.
- Supporting all teachers with their Digital learning.
- leading the significant work during Term 1 in preparing staff and students for online learning.
- Established and trained staff with MS Teams for online learning and communication.
- Coordination of additional devices in the Junior Primary classrooms.

Students with a Disability Program (SWD) and NCCD (National Consistent Collection of data for SWD)

The Students with a Disability (SWD) Program is a very important part of the teaching and learning. Mr Catalano has overseen this program that monitors the progress of our students and the supports needed in classrooms. He has also developed a Catholic Primary Schools hub group of teachers and leaders to support the Professional learning of teachers and ESO's in multiple areas including ASD and Dyslexia.

Ben Catalano led this work with the following outcomes:

- A new process for the identification of students with learning needs was developed.
- This process led to the identification of additional students that were added to the school's NCCD audit list.
- Teachers met with the SWD Coordinator termly to review
- Student assessment
- Adjustment needs / levels
- Parent communication
- New Allied Health reports/assessments
- 2020 NCCD results were
 - Substantial | 20 students
 - Supplementary | 40 students
 - $_{\odot}$ Support with QDTP | 20 students
- Targeted intervention models were developed to support students in:
 - Quicksmart
 - Number
 - Phonic and phonological awareness
 - Spelling
 - Reading
 Writing
- Ben Catalano coordinator the newly developed Schools of the South West Adelaide: Students with a Disability project. This project has led to:
- Professional learning for staff in:
- Speech and Language

- Autism Spectrum Disorder
- Understanding and supporting classroom behaviour
- CESA funding that supported the professional learning program

Music Program

The Music Program has two features, the School program run by Mrs Toni Smedley and the Instrumental Tutorial Program run by Pathways Music School. Both aspects are important parts of our learning programs.

The School Choir managed to perform in an online concert of the Catholic Schools Music Festival.

Pathways Music School continues to teach students in singing, guitar, keyboard and drums. They managed to get in one instrumental concert this year. Mr Dan and Mrs Carly Sherwood who are the owners of Pathways Music School, and also parents in the school, are to be congratulated for the excellent program and service they provide.

LEADERSHIP AND SCHOOL MANAGEMENT

The school has seen significant enrolment growth since 2018 and the August census was 450 students. The staff grew to 50. These were the largest in the history of the school. This has required significant management work of resources and the budget. The school is fortunate to have such a smart and hardworking leadership team, office administration and Board personal.

The School Board and Leadership team worked together to maintain school programs and capital development. There were several major decisions that were made:

- Stage 2 Capital works program Early Years and Middle Years building development.
- Negotiating with the Parish Council to purchase a portion of their property.
- Negotiating with Marion Council to use Spinnaker Circuit Reserve East for school car parking.
- Negotiating with Marion Council to make Berrima Road one way.
- Split the current large Year 4 classes into 3 Year 5 classes of 20 students in 2021.

FACILITIES AND RESOURCES

Capital Works

The Stage 2 Capital Works Program will provide the best Early Years facilities in the South West of Adelaide. It will be complete in March 2021. The Middle Primary learning space will be ready for the start of 2021 and this will enable the school to have three distinct areas for learning, this is Reception – Year 2, Year 3 and Year 4; and Years 5 and Year 6.

The Office and all the classrooms from Reception to Year 4 will be painted during this holiday and a veranda will be built along the back of the Pit classrooms.

This year solar panels were added to the Administration building to provide a significant reduction to our electricity costs. This is in addition to the panels that will be added to the new Reception classrooms.

iPad Program

The iPad Program from Year 3 – Year 6 began its second cycle of upgrade where every student in these years is given this tool for their learning development. This second cycle has meant that there are now 12 iPads in all Reception – Year 2 classes. This program started 4 years ago is an example of good strategic planning as we have been at the front of NAPLAN online, home learning and the move by catholic education to have a new operating system. All staff have continued with their Professional development as a recognised Apple school.

Canteen

The Canteen continues to provide a great service to the families and has been very busy over the year. Kylie Reidy is to be congratulated for her amazing work and wonderful organisation. Kylie Reidy also supports the school Sport Program each Saturday morning in Terms 2 and 3, Parent Community activities and school events such as Sports Day. Lily Nicholls began as a support worker this year which has provided good support for the program.

Out of hours School Care / Vacation Care

A significant school program managed by Pam Adams The school is open for 50 weeks of the year from 7am until 6:20pm to support families. The staff are to be congratulated for their wonderful work. In 2021, the OHSC and Vacation Care Program will also access the new Year 3 and Year 4 open learning area.

ENROLMENT GROWTH

The school has seen significant growth in enrolments since 2018. This has required vision and thorough planning. This year Kirsty Catalano was made Enrolment Registrar as part of her administration role and this has enabled the school to maintain an excellence in its service to families through the enrolment process.

Enrolments for 2020 reached 450 with the mid-year Reception class, the most students in the history of the school. A decision in 2018 to meet the need of our community by only having one year level per class, has meant that this year there were three classes up to Year 2 and by 2024 there will be three classes at year 6. In 2021 there will also be three Year 5 classes. Already in 2022, we have a waiting list for the Reception classes.

STRATEGIC PLAN 2021-2023

There is much in our community to cherish and to maintain because its good and it works. St Martin de Porres School has developed a "distinct point of difference" for families who are seeking a school which celebrates community.

The school will continue to evolve through its growth in enrolments and there will be much to look forward to. A new plan will be developed in 2021 at school board and leadership level. The school will have three classes at each year level and will grow to approximately 21 classes and 500 students by 2024.

For 2021 the following will occur:

- The Early Years building will be available in March.
- We welcome three new teaching staff members and a Speech Pathologist to our School.
- Further consolidation of Maths and literacy programs.
- A student with a disability teacher Rosetta Hamood- will coordinate this program.
- Two new playground equipment additions will be added.
- Negotiating with Marion council on the use of Spinnaker Circuit Reserve East.
- Negotiating with the Parish Council on the user of the Parish House.

The year 2020 will no doubt go down as one of the most exceptional years our school, our community and indeed the world has experienced in generations. It has been a year of difficult and uncertain times and yet, thinking back over this year, we also have a lot we can be grateful for.

St Martin de Porres School welcomed 417 new and returning students at the beginning of the year, growing to 450 students by Term 3. The continuing success of our learning programs, exceptional teachers & leaders, and our cohesive and respectful school community, has resulted in our School having very strong actual and projected enrolment numbers for the years to come which has been recognised by the Director of Catholic Education.

In early March we faced a very new, very different problem – fair to say one that we haven't faced before – COVID19. From the onset, the School Board and School Leadership worked closely on what potential impacts this new world might bring, what expectations our parents and students might have, and how we might be able to mobilise quickly if, at a drop of a hat, we needed to provide some form of remote/online learning.

Well, the drop of a hat did come by mid-late March, and on behalf of the School Board and as a parent of children at St Martin de Porres School, I am deeply grateful for the commitment of our teachers and leaders, who ensured during moments of uncertainty, our children were able to continue their growth and learning development even when some were schooling remotely. I have no doubt it was a difficult and time-consuming task.

But as they say, the show must go on... As the year progressed, our attentions were refocused on addressing our growth. This provided the School Board with a new and exciting opportunity to further review and agree upon our second major building program (which is now well underway), offering new classrooms, learning spaces, play spaces and a new welcoming entrance into our school. This will enable St Martin de Porres School to continue to offer an education of excellence to our children in the years to come.

Some items your School Board has consulted on to date are (not exhaustive):

- Supporting School Leadership with the purchase and development of parish land and the new buildings behind our junior primary classrooms and "the pit".
- Review of the SACCS Fee Policy and approval of school budget, resulting in a sustainable tuition fee reduction and simplification of school fees.
- Supporting discussions with Marion Council regarding various options that affect our school and local community, including the
 use of vacant council land and traffic management during peak times. Negotiations on vacant land still continue and Council is
 intending to remodel Berrima Road at the end of this year; and
- The review of parent community concerns regarding the material of some new uniform items investigations into other options are well underway.

There are always many people deserving of thankyous and it's impossible to name them all without missing someone. With the "interesting" year we have all had, it's important to think about the small things each and every one of us can do and be grateful for. This year could not go by without another big thank you to our teachers, support team, leadership and volunteers. You allowed our children to feel a sense of normalcy in a world of uncertainty and fear.

Thank you to our wider school community for the broad acceptance and overall patience during the unknowns, it allowed your School Board to stay focused on the future.

Finally, I wish to thank 3 of our retiring board members Justin Monsoor, Kimberly Davis and Paul Robinson, who have diligently committed their time attending all School Board Meetings and extra forums as required, with Justin serving 4 years as Parent/Finance Representative, Kimberly serving 3 years as Parent/Parent Organised Sport Program (POSP) Representative and Paul Robinson serving 3 years as Parent / Parent Community (formally P&F Committee) Representative.

The continuous growth of our school is a strong reflection of the values we deliver through our schools' leadership, teaching staff and community. I look forward to seeing our children and community flourishing and embracing our new school facilities next year. Have a Safe, Healthy and Merry Christmas.

On behalf of every parent within our community, the leadership, admin staff and teaching staff have been amazing with the children and families during these unprecedented times of a world pandemic. Thank you to all of you.
